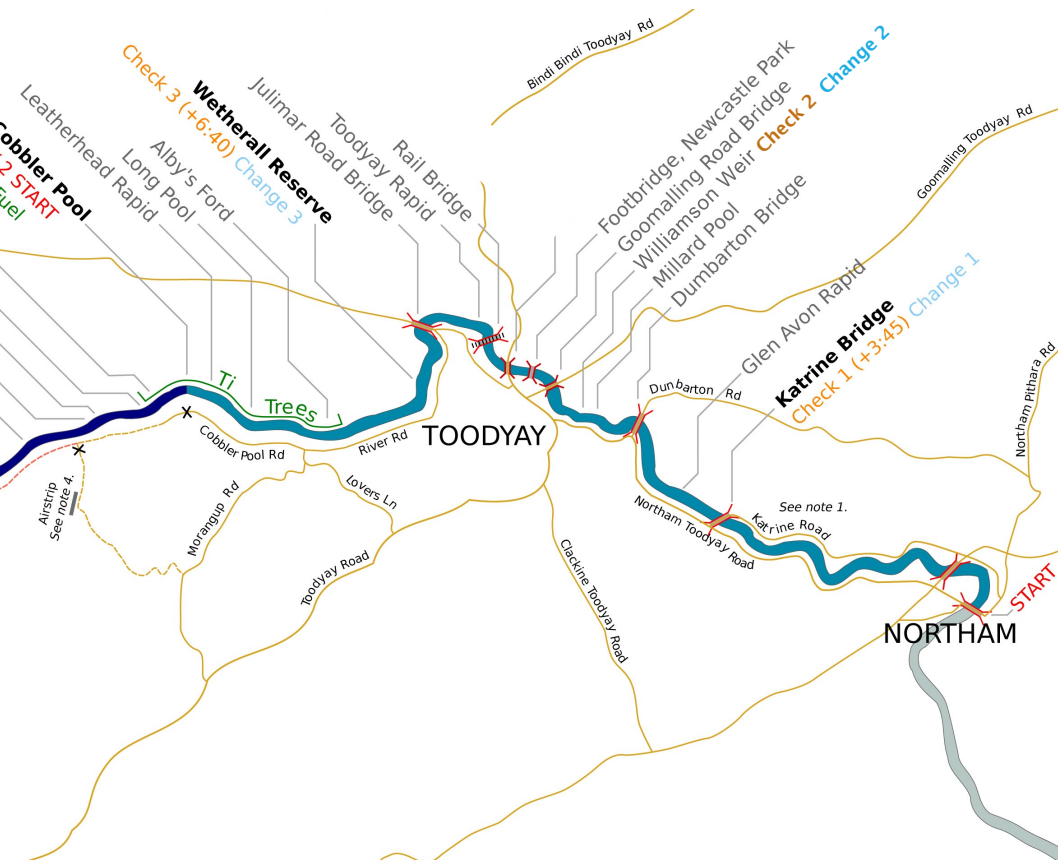

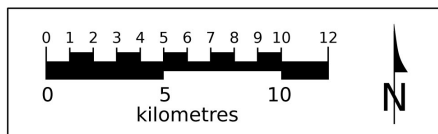

Course Map

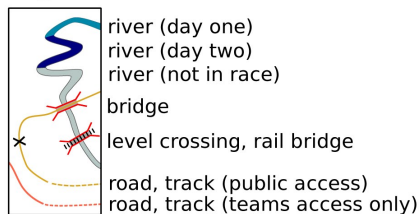

More than just a race

The Avon Descent is an exciting weekend of river racing and festival fun!

The unique Western Australian event offers competitors long stretches of flat water to whitewater rapids, thick ti trees, rocky drops and all varieties of challenges a changing, untamed river environment can present.

In addition to the traditional, 124km two-day challenge, the Avon Descent weekend offers short course options and on day 2, there are paddle courses and opportunities to participate for everyone—no experience necessary!

Not to mention festivals at Northam, Lilac Hill and Bayswater, and excellent spectating at Garvey Park. For more information on what the 2025 Avon Descent has to offer, visit avondescent.com.au

Access to spectator spots

Competitors and spectators are advised to only access the river from publicly accessible locations. Northam's Avon Descent Association is generously given permission to run the event by making use of private land and must ensure landowner wishes are respected at all times to ensure the event can continue.

All spectators must use common sense when assessing the suitability of their chosen viewing location, including distance from the river and likelihood of craft exiting the water. Please note the following:

- **Katrine Bridge** — Please follow traffic management instructions.
- **'Glen Avon' Rapid** — Situated on private land and must not be accessed without explicit landowner permission.
- **Extracts/Williamson Weir** — Access is limited. Adjacent farmland is strictly private property and you must have landowner permission to do so.
- **Ti Trees on Day One** (otherwise known as 'Deepdale' or 'the Drainpipes') — Access only via Wetherall Reserve. All areas downriver of Wetherall Reserve until Cobbler Pool road are situated on private property and are strictly prohibited. Much of this area includes sensitive biological control areas and Police will enforce attempts at trespassing.
- **Cobbler Pool** — Access during the Avon Descent is restricted and there is a fee to park.
- **The Valley Road** — This area is not accessible to the public, only to authorised vehicles. There is a high level of train traffic making it very dangerous.
- **Emu Falls** — Walking access only.
- **Stronghills Farm** — Private leasehold land and not open to the public.
- **Walyunga Pool** — This is a National park area and rules apply. A fee is applicable on entry.
- **Bells Rapids** — Access during the Avon Descent is restricted and parking is available at the State Equestrian Centre, Cathedral Avenue.

General public access to river not permitted

The general public is not permitted on the water, along the event course, during the Avon Descent. Emergency Services and volunteer rescue and recovery must be focused on the safety and wellbeing of event participants. Please do not distract them.

Spectating on bridges

Stopping or standing on any bridge is not permitted during the event.

Limited parking

Spectators to observe local government regulations. Some spectator locations will no longer allow public parking. This is outside the management of the Avon Descent.

The above arrival times are a guide only. These indicate when the first paddle and power craft will pass by each spectator location at high, medium and low river levels. Many factors affect these times including rainfall and start times.

For instance, higher river levels means faster flowing water and faster moving participants... which could be the case this year! For more information on current and historical river levels visit water.thebeatentrack.org

Be aware that start times may be delayed 30-minutes or more if there is fog along the course to allow time for it to clear, and this will affect times throughout that day. Please visit the Avon Descent website for historical race times and current participant information avondescent.com.au
